

Sometimes we get so caught up in the present that we forget about those who were essential in getting us to where we are today. This is how it was with the passing of our last original Trustee, Earl Johnson, who passed away from natural causes last October at the age of 93.

One of the best natured and cheerful people I have ever known, Earl was born in St. Louis, in 1929. He enlisted in the Naval Reserve in 1947. In 1953, he was called up on active duty and assigned to USS ALVIN C. COCKRELL (DE-366) as a shipfitter. According to Earl, the ship had a notorious problem with clogged drains and overboard discharges, and he spent his first four months aboard getting the plumbing straightened out. During his time, he

made WestPac deployments that included three months as a station ship in Hong Kong.

Upon discharge, Earl completed a degree in finance at California State University, and spent his career in securities and investments. In the eighties, he became active with the Destroyer Escort Sailors Association. He and his wife, Ann, were regulars at every DESA Reunion. He became president of the Los Angeles Chapter of DESA, and joined the SLATER Board when DESA acquired the ship from Greece. There is still some debate as to whether his most significant contribution to USS SLATER's restoration was with the plumbing work he did in the restoration of the aft crew's head or the fact that he raised over \$100,000 for the project. Back in the days when we didn't have two nickles to rub together, he ran several raffles through the LA Chapter.

Earl's death, and the fact that we will be hosting the final DESA Reunion, brings to light that we are witnessing the end of an era, the passing of the greatest generation. Dori Glaser, DESA's



In Collections, John has been continuing work on a few projects. A new display will showcase our USS STAFFORD (DE-411) collection of artifacts and documents. Nearly all of it

was donated by a single donor a few years ago. They include photographs, notebooks, blueprints, deck logs, and fragments from the kamikaze that crashed into her starboard side near frame 96, on 5 January 1945. The doner's father, Lt. (j.g) Carl H. Williams, Jr., was the antisubmarine warfare officer at the time. Captain Craig refused to lose the ship, and ordered most of his crew transferred to USS ULVERT M. MOORE (DE-442), under the command of Lt. Cmdr. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., the President's son. Lt. (j.g.) Williams remained aboard and helped keep the ship afloat.


Super Dave Mardon was rebuilding the port breakwater watertight door. Chuck Teal and Danny completed the work on the port B-3 supply fan room and restarted work on the foc's'cle hatch. Barry, and his crew of reservists and midshipmen, are wrapping up the messdecks pipe insulation project. **Barry** and **Alex** successfully opened up an overboard discharge valve on the upper-level port side of B-3 for any future dewatering that may be needed. The valve was also refurbished but not yet leak checked.

In early February the temperature dropped to minus thirteen degrees. The extreme cold weather caused paint to pop off the steel on many places around the superstructure. As a result of all the peeling paint during the extreme cold weather, Walt, Bill, Thomas, and Ron have been scaling paint and feathering edges, so the bare spots will be ready for repainting come warmer weather. We want the ship looking as good as possible for the upcoming DESA Reunion and the HNSA Convention.

There are very few of the original World War II DESA members left. Their places have been taken by Sailors who served the postwar Navy. They served in the DER radar pickets and the "1000-class" ships, such as the DEALY, CLAUDE JONES, GARCIA, and KNOX class ships.
