June has been a jam-packed full month for our crew. We welcomed aboard just over 400 students from Green Tech High, Green Meadow Elementary, West Canada Valley Middle School, Griffiss Institute, SUNY Orange, St. Pius V School, summer camps, and participated in the Museum Ships Radio Weekend.

Chuck Chandler and Steve Syrotynski made sure we kept up our participation in the Historic Ships Radio Weekend, and requests for QSL Cards are still coming in. We also held an event with the East Greenbush Amateur Radio Association in which they operated from our radio room. More than a dozen EGARA members operated Station WW2DEM aboard USS SLATER. The club operated a total of four transmitters during the event from 8

am to 4 pm, including the ship's vintage 1940's rig. Despite the bands being less than ideal, they achieved a total of 149 contacts.

After much convincing on Shanna and James' part, Mike and the rest of the engineers finally agreed to start the 8cylinder engine for an audience! The event started with James, in our new classroom, explaining the history of diesel engines and how they won WWII for the Allies. He then led us into SLATER's After Engine Room (B-3) where everyone donned their safety glasses and ear protection to watch the crew start the engine and let her run for about 10 minutes. It was great to show how much work our volunteers have put into the engines over the last 26 years, and how dedicated the current crew is to keeping things running smoothly.

The maintenance crew continued with several projects. In addition to assisting the building contractors as needed,

they worked on several projects to prepare the ship for the upcoming DESA Reunion. Most important to me was the chipping and painting of our decks and superstructure. Chipping and painting on the fantail and the maindeck port and starboard is now complete. **Key Bank** also sent ten volunteers as part of their "**Neighbors Make a Difference Day**" to repaint the maindeck on the starboard side. We'll start scaling and repaint the 01-level next.

Danny, Earl, and Warren are progressing nicely on the aft three-inch gun ready service ammo lockers. They rigged a pipe frame over the gun tub so he can lift the lockers with a chain fall and move them around as he replaces the wasted metal. He's rebuilding the locker doors at the work bench.

The biggest headache for the maintenance crew has been that the train gear drive failed on the forward three-inch gun, which is our display gun. A bevel gear failed. Doug and his crew removed the manual gear drive from gun 32 and installed it in gun 31, so our display gun is operational again.

For the number two three-inch gun, Doug has found a pair of gears that are commercially available that he can install in gun 32. Working with his nephew Chuck, Chuck Teal,
Super Dave Mardon and our machinist Alex, Doug purchased the shafting material and bushing material to turn a new shaft and two bushings for gun 32. They are also planning to make a bushing spacer so we can load the thrust bearing because the new gear is thinner than the original.

The shipfitters also completed the process of welding the new padeyes for hoisting the whaleboat. These are essential so we can rig the boat correctly when we hoist it aboard in October. Other projects we have going include repairing the sink faucets in the aft head, the sink faucet leak in the forward head, repairing the deck drain in the aft head, holes in the bridge wing deck over Ship's Office, a fire main leak over **Angelo's** Sewing machine, and rigging a compressed air connection on the fo'c's'cle.

Can you think of anything that goes better together than beer and Sailors? We can't. On June 3^{rd,} to celebrate SLATER's 79th Anniversary of Commissioning, our friends at Allied Brewing brewed up a special USS SLATER Summer Ale and came aboard to help us share it with our friends and supporters. The event attracted 95 people to taste the beer, eat the tacos, and tour the ship. A successful night for sure! Last but not least, the family of Albert St. Jean joined us for DESA's final reunion. Albert had been one of SLATER's first volunteers when she was in NYC. He was also one of the "SLATER 7" who rode the ship north to Albany in 1997. He served aboard USS OTTERSTETTER (DE-244) during the war and remained in the Naval Reserve for many years after. He had saved a few volumes of the ship's newsletter and we are grateful to add these one-of-a-kind documents to our collection. DEHM and DESA are separate organizations with different boards of directors. DESA created DEHM in 1993, when they acquired SLATER, with bylaws that enabled anyone who wanted to support USS SLATER to join. They realized in 1993 that they needed an organization that would go on in perpetuity. They created a new organization, to own SLATER with membership open to anyone, to maintain USS SLATER for future generations.

As DESA created the SLATER organization, we believed we owed it to DESA to bid farewell on a high note hence, so we hosted the reunion. We'll continue to preserve DE

history through the ship's restoration and preservation, as well as archive the stories of the ships and her crews.

Finally, we bid farewell to two of our most treasured volunteers in June. William "Boats" Haggart ran our deck department for fifteen years, and taught marlinspike seamanship to anyone who wanted to learn. He was an institution during his years aboard, and his presence taking care of the details of deck seamanship made my life a whole lot easier. We also lost Gordon Lattey, following a long illness, who has been involved with the project from the beginning. Gordon, and his wife Michele **Vennard** played critical roles in bringing SLATER to Albany. Without them reporting to the Mayor that this was a doable project with great potential, it is
