Mid February ... Only six more weeks until opening day ... April First.

That's only six more weeks to finish the second deck forward, the messdeck, crew's berthing, CPO mess and passage. Better stay on that paint chipping, but **Joanne McFadden and Pat Perrella** are bugging me that it's time to put out another **Signals**, so down with the needle gun and back to the desk!

Weather conditions continuing to present obstacles. The ice is out of the river, but last Monday it was 7 degrees at 9 am. Eight volunteers were aboard; everyone over the age of 70 with the exception of **Rafael.** There's nothing more frustrating than having 5 men ready to chip paint and the airlines are clogged with ice - it slows us down but does not stop us!

We're making good progress- All the tile has been pulled off the second deck and all the decks are ready for painting. Barry, Larry and Gary along with several helpers whose names don't rhyme have completely rewired the messdecks and berthing space; installing incandescent light fixtures, red lights, compartment fans, emergency lights, switchboxes and fuse boxes. Almost all hands have had a part in cutting out old cable and replacing it with new armored cable. Clark Farnsworth and George Erwin have done the metal work; welding brackets for light fixtures, hooks for bunks, repairing watertight doors and making grills for vents. Tom Moore and Angelo Bracco continue work replacing insulation. Tom Beeler is making locker tops for the CPO mess. Chippers Dick, Chris, Les, Mike, Bob, Gordon, and Dutch and a host of others - disguised with masks & goggles - lead the way with Ray Lammers hauling out countless buckets of trash and chips topside. Roy Gunther moves in to prep and mask the spaces for painting. We have also received lots of help from the Albany Naval Reserve Center's LST Unit.

Chris Fedden and Bob Callender have become a two-man destruction team, ripping out postwar bulkheads and ductwork with a sawzall, chisel and grinder. No torches needed-- Somehow we'll have it all together for opening day.

Dick Walker has all the nuts and bolts pretty well squared away, saving the rest of us hours of searching. The new locker is located right forward of the machine shop and the 20 mm magazine. The old storage locker aft formerly known as "nut and bolt hell" will become a DC locker.

We moved the crew out of the Chief's Quarters and up to the wardroom until we finish painting below. So, if you 're looking for the joe pot it's been moved. For the winter months the Coffee Fund has also become the Kerosene Fund. We need both in the morning- just so no one get confused which is which! **Rafael Suarez has issued a challenge to the crew.** He says he can scale the forward crew berthing space faster than the rest of the crew can do the messdecks. Like *JOHN HENRY* versus the STEAM DRILL, "a man ain't nuthin but a man". But Raf is close on our tails and he's doing a real quality job.

During the first week of May, we will welcome the members of the *MICHIGAN CHAPTER OF DESA*. They will live aboard Slater for another workweek. Plans are for them to continue with topside painting and work on the flying bridge companionway. We have heard they already have 17 men signed up!

It's a cold water hose, pier side port-a-john, and the bunks are more cramped than you remember, but if you can handle it, WE NEED YOU!!!

Speaking of Road Trips, Roy Gunther and Gordon Lattey are planning another scrounging trip to Portsmouth, Virginia the week of March 15th.
